Base your horticultural decisions on:

- A deep, abiding respect for the environment.
- The latest scientifically-sound, research-based information.
- Employ Earth Kind techniques of plant selection and culture to avoid pest problems before they occur.
- Use pesticides only as a last resort. If a pesticide becomes absolutely necessary, then select the most Earth Kind or environmentally responsible product available.
- Putting Earth Kind techniques into everyday practice will help your family, your business, your community and your environment. Remember, "Earth Kind to benefit human kind."

Recycling Recommendations!



The practice of recycling is simply a habit; perhaps it's not always convenient, nor is it easy, but it is necessary, and it is the right thing to do. Recycling, composting, soil and water conservation, and the responsible, safe use of pesticides are practices stressed by the Master Gardener program.

Texans throw away more than 29 million tons of trash (over 7 pounds of waste per person) every day! Historically 20% of solid waste generated by Texans consists of grass clippings, leaves and other landscape waste. It's time to make some lifestyle changes.



Common household waste items take a long time to break down in the environment!

Remember the 4 "Environmental R's": **REDUCE, RECYCLE, REUSE** and **REBUY!** Below are some tips which will help each of us become responsible citizens:

REDUCE

- Purchase supplies in bulk and/or those with less packaging.
- Rent or borrow tools and equipment for limited use.
- Leave grass clippings on your lawn as mulch.
- Buy and use durable items instead of throwaways.
- Use cloth napkins and towels.

RECYCLE

- Purchase supplies that are packaged from recycled materials.
- Collect, separate and process all recyclable materials.
- Recycle household cardboard/boxes.
- Compost your yard waste!
- Clean & disinfect used plastic plant pots for reuse!



Properly composted yard waste can be utilized as mulch to prevent weeds and conserve moisture.

REUSE

- Use durable coffee mugs instead of Styrofoam.
- Donate old magazines to hospitals, nursing homes, etc.
- Donate surplus building materials.
- Reuse boxes for storage.
- Turn empty jars into storage containers.
- Utilize refillable pens and pencils.
- Participate in a paint collection and reuse programs.
- Use newspapers as a method of weed control under mulch.

REBUY

- Have a garage sale.
- Go to a garage/estate sale.
- Check the classified ads before purchasing a new item.
- Shop online for "reused" items.

Recycling, including composting, diverted 72 million tons of material away from landfills and incinerators in 2003. Reusing items (repairing, donating or selling) also reduces waste; when possible, reusing items is even better than recycling because the item doesn't need to be reprocessed before using again.
